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Dear Friends of the Rothko Chapel,

This past year has been one of profound resilience and renewal. In the face of challenges both natural and societal, we have remained steadfast in our mission to serve as a sanctuary for contemplation and a catalyst for dialogue on the urgent moral and spiritual questions of our time.

Throughout the 2024–2025 season, our programs invited the community to reflect on what it means to heal—personally, collectively, and globally. From the *Concert for Peace* in collaboration with the Jaipur Literature Festival, to our Martin Luther King, Jr. Birthday Observance on the health impacts of war, to *Night of Ideas* with Dr. Peter Hotez, each gathering embodied the Chapel’s founding purpose: to unite art, spirituality, and social justice in service to our shared humanity.

This year also marked the completion of a comprehensive five-year strategic plan. This work clarified our vision for the future and reaffirmed the Chapel’s commitment to fostering spiritual growth, creative engagement, and social justice. The plan positions us for thoughtful growth—expanding awareness of the Chapel’s mission, deepening our impact, and reaching more people in Houston and around the world who seek meaning, connection, and a place for reflection. These guiding priorities will shape how we steward our reflective space, evolve our programming, strengthen partnerships, and ensure broad access for all who turn to the Chapel as a source of grounding and inspiration.

In the summer of 2024, Hurricane Beryl brought unexpected hardship, causing structural damage to the Chapel and affecting several of Mark Rothko’s monumental panels. While the building reopened in December after extensive repairs, the paintings remain in conservation—receiving the same care and reverence that have defined the Chapel since its inception. Even during this period, our mission has continued with undiminished strength. Off-site programs, collaborative partnerships, and creative adaptations allowed us to sustain connection and uphold the Chapel’s role as a space for reflection, dialogue, and renewal.

As we look ahead, we do so with deep gratitude and optimism. Our *Opening Spaces* campus expansion—now advancing into its final phase—will provide new facilities for programs and gathering spaces, extending the Chapel’s reach for generations to come. These projects represent not only physical growth, but an expansion of our shared capacity to build understanding, empathy, and peace in an increasingly fractured world.

We are grateful to all who make this work possible—our visitors, donors, staff, volunteers, board members, and community partners. Your commitment ensures that even as our paintings undergo restoration, the spirit and mission of Rothko Chapel continue to illuminate lives and inspire action.

A New Strategic Direction

In 2024, the Chapel completed a comprehensive five-year strategic plan, “Rothko Chapel: Beyond 50,” a process that clarified the institution’s identity, strengthened its programmatic vision, and aligned its operations with long-term organizational goals. As part of this work, the Chapel refined its Statement of Purpose, Mission, Vision, and Values to better reflect its evolving role as a sanctuary for reflection and a catalyst for social change. These guiding statements now anchor every facet of the Chapel’s work—from visitor experience and programming to community partnerships and global reach.





Statement of Purpose

To be a welcoming and inspiring space, create opportunities for individual and community spiritual growth, and foster engagement with critical social justice issues.

To steward a reflective space and present programs that promote spirituality, creativity, dialogue, and action leading to more equitable, empowered, and engaged communities.

We envision a future where artistic expression, spirituality and creative activism are integrated to enhance the awareness, effectiveness, and sustainability of social change agents.

Who We Are

Rothko Chapel is a place open to all, where art, spirituality, and public life converge. The Chapel invites individuals and communities to find stillness, deepen inner awareness, and engage with the pressing moral issues shaping our world.

Strategic Priorities (2024–2029)

The progress made this fiscal year demonstrates how the Chapel’s ongoing efforts align with the priorities defined in the 2024 Strategic Plan. The advancement of the *Opening Spaces* initiative, our off-site programming during the Chapel’s temporary closure, our strengthened partnerships across Houston, and the development of new administrative and archival resources all reflect the Plan’s core aims. These strategic priorities offer a cohesive framework for understanding the work underway and the milestones ahead, ensuring that the Chapel’s mission is carried forward with clarity and purpose.

Guided by the 2024 Strategic Plan, the Chapel is focused on:

1. Stewardship of a Reflective Space

Preserving the Chapel and expanded campus as sanctuaries for contemplation, healing, and creativity.

2. Transformative Programming

Producing interfaith, artistic, human rights, and wellness programs that inspire inquiry, connection, and meaningful action.

3. Integration of Art, Spirituality & Activism

Strengthening the Chapel’s role as a hub for creative activism and spiritually grounded social justice work.

4. Community Capacity & Engagement

Supporting people and organizations working toward systemic change through dialogue, resources, partnerships, and public platforms.

5. Organizational Sustainability

Ensuring long-term environmental, financial, and institutional resilience for future generations.

Program Highlights

Resilience and Renewal in a Year of Challenge

Rothko Chapel's program season unfolded in the shadow of Hurricane Beryl, which struck just as our season was set to begin in July 2024. The storm caused significant damage to several paintings and forced the Chapel to close its doors for five months, yet even in this period of challenge, the Chapel's work did not pause.

Through the resilience of our staff, the strength of community partnerships, and the unwavering support of our friends, donors, and audiences, our season moved forward with determination and purpose. Programs were carried on across the city—into museums, churches, universities, and cultural centers—transforming Houston into an extended sanctuary for contemplation, dialogue, and collective healing.

Off-site gatherings became a powerful reminder that the Chapel is more than its physical walls. Whether exploring the intersections of spirituality and human rights, engaging in interfaith reflection, or offering moments of stillness and renewal, our programs continued to advance the Chapel's mission at a time when connection, compassion, and justice were needed most.

Peace and Global Perspectives

The season opened on September 6, 2024, with a *Concert for Peace* in partnership with the **Jaipur Literature Festival Houston** and the **Museum of Fine Arts, Houston**. Sitarist Pandit Shubhendra Rao and cellist Saskia Rao-de Haas, accompanied by Subroto Bhattacharya on tabla, offered a contemplative performance in observance of the **International Day of Peace**. Youth poets from Fay School and a lecture by Bradley Bailey, Curator of Asian Art, enriched the evening, underscoring the Chapel's role as a convener of global artistic and cultural dialogue.



Interfaith Healing & Reflection

On November 1, 2024, the Chapel hosted an **interfaith observance of Día de los Muertos and All Saints' Day** at Covenant Church. Leaders from **ISKCON**, the **Zoroastrian Association of Houston**, **Alexander Jewish Family Service**, **Myoken-ji Temple**, and the **Islamic Society of Greater Houston**, alongside music by Jesus Lozano, created a sacred space for remembrance. Attendees added photos and mementos to a community *ofrenda*, honoring loved ones while finding comfort in shared tradition.

Later that month, on November 7, 2024, the Chapel co-presented a **talk on faith and race** the launch of *Undivided: The Quest for Racial Solidarity in an American Church* at **Rice University**. Author and Hopkins University political science professor Hahrie Han joined Pastor Chuck Mingo and congregant Jess McKnight for a timely conversation on spirituality, racism, and healing in divided times.

On December 12, 2024, the Chapel and the **Institute for Spirituality and Health** co-presented an **annual holiday program of grief and healing** at The Jung Center. With storytelling, meditation, music, and a restorative singing bowls sound bath, the program provided solace for those navigating loss during the holiday season.



Confronting Injustice

On January 15, 2025, the Chapel observed the **birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.** with *Sick of War: Understanding Health Impacts of U.S. Militarism*. Political anthropologist **David Vine** delivered a keynote tracing the intersections of U.S. military bases, economics, and public health, followed by a panel featuring **Dr. Seema Jilani**, **Pratik Chakrabarti, PhD**, and **Rev. Dr. Kelly Wadsworth**. The program echoed Dr. King's call to confront militarism as a barrier to justice and peace.



The Chapel was also proud to be among 20 U.S. hosts of **Villa Albertine's "Night of Ideas"** on March 28, 2025, a nationwide cultural marathon coordinated by the **Institut Français**. Under the theme *Common Ground*, the Chapel highlighted health justice through performances by the **Texas Medical Center Orchestra**, talks by journalist **Prune Antoine**, and

moving presentations from **Toni Hickman** and **Sofia Heyl**. The evening culminated in a keynote by **Dr. Peter Hotez**, whose book *The Deadly Rise of Anti-science* underscored the urgent need to protect science in a time of polarization.

Families, Youth, and the Arts

On April 22, 2025, the Chapel hosted its **Earth Day Poetry Festival**, curated by **Outspoken Bean** with **Writers in the Schools**. The program featured Meta4 Houston and local poets and musicians whose performances highlighted environmental justice and collective responsibility.

On May 3, 2025, the Chapel partnered with **Align Mind** for **Meditative Moment for Families**, a playful and calming session of animal-inspired yoga, breathing, and expressive drawing. Designed for children Pre-K through 3rd grade and their caregivers, the program nurtured mindfulness, gratitude, and emotional well-being, closing with a soothing child-centered meditation.

On May 17, 2025, the Chapel opened its doors to families and young audiences through **Neighborhood Community Day**, a celebration of creativity, imagination, and cultural heritage. Partnering with **Express Children's Theatre**, the event brought theatre and visual art to life for children across the community. Families met a time-traveling Frida Kahlo, explored the themes behind her artwork, and created their own self-portraits—transforming the Chapel's campus into a joyful space of artistic discovery and intergenerational connection.



Seasonal Rituals and Celebration

The season concluded with the Chapel's beloved **Summer Solstice** celebrations on June 20, 2025. Pianist **Matthew Shipp**, presented by **Nameless Sound**, offered two improvisational performances exploring silence, sound, and space. In the evening, the grounds came alive with the thunderous rhythms of **Kaminari Taiko**, bringing the community together in celebration of light, energy, and renewal.

Impact and Resilience

Rothko Chapel's 2024–2025 season demonstrated the power of partnership and perseverance. Even though our doors remained closed for repairs, our mission remained open and active across Houston. From global peace concerts and interfaith rituals of healing to urgent conversations on science, justice, and militarism, to family-centered programs that nurtured creativity and mindfulness, the season embodied the Chapel's role as both a sanctuary for contemplation and a catalyst for action.

A Campaign for the Rothko Chapel

From 2024–2025, the Chapel continued to build strong momentum on **Opening Spaces**, the multi-year campus expansion that will deepen our capacity for reflection, learning, and community engagement. Significant progress was made on the development and construction of both the **Kathleen & Chuck Mullenweg Peace and Reflection Garden** and the new Administration Building, which will include the **Michael Piana Board Room** and the **Cyvia Wolff Archives and Library**.

The work accomplished this year moves these transformative projects into their final stages and prepares the Chapel for the next phase of implementation. As we enter the next fiscal year, the *Opening Spaces* initiative includes groundbreaking scheduled for December 2024 on the expanded campus elements. This new facility will significantly enhance our ability to host mission-aligned programs, convenings, and community gatherings. This milestone marks the transition from years of planning and preparation into the culminating stage of construction and activation that will shape the Chapel's expanded campus for decades to come.

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INSPIRIT: The Rothko Chapel’s Annual Evening of Inspiration

In March 2025, the Rothko Chapel hosted its annual INSPIRIT gala—an evening that brings together supporters from across Houston and around the country to celebrate the Chapel’s mission and advance its transformative work. As our largest fundraising event of the year, INSPIRIT plays a vital role in sustaining the Chapel’s programs, community partnerships, and leadership at the intersection of art, spirituality, and social justice.

This year’s INSPIRIT centered on a powerful conversation exploring the role of art as a catalyst for activism and social change. Renowned artist and activist **Shepard Fairey** joined Houston-based multidisciplinary artist **Trenton Doyle Hancock** for an in-depth dialogue moderated by art historian **Dr. Alvia J. Wardlaw**. Together, they examined how visual culture shapes public consciousness, mobilizes communities, and confronts critical human rights issues, a theme deeply aligned with the Chapel’s founding purpose.

Held at The Astorian, the evening gathered hundreds of donors, community leaders, artists, and advocates. Guests reflected not only on the Chapel’s artistic legacy, but also on its continued role as a sanctuary for connection, contemplation, and civic engagement. INSPIRIT affirmed the enduring relevance of the Chapel’s mission during a time of cultural fragmentation, offering a space where creativity, spirituality, and justice converge.

In addition to the program, INSPIRIT 2025 featured a benefit art auction presented by **McClain Gallery**, with more than twenty museum-quality works on view at C2 Art Advisors. An edition of prints by Houston artist **Aaron Parazette**, inspired by the Rothko Chapel, were also offered in support of the Chapel’s work. The dedication of presenting



sponsors **Maire and David Baldwin** and the **Muriel Pollia Foundation**, along with the generosity of attendees, helped ensure the event’s success and expanded the Chapel’s capacity to reach more people with its mission of dialogue, healing, and human dignity.

Inspirit continues to be a profound expression of the Rothko Chapel’s values, celebrating the transformative power of the arts while strengthening the foundation for the Chapel’s future impact.

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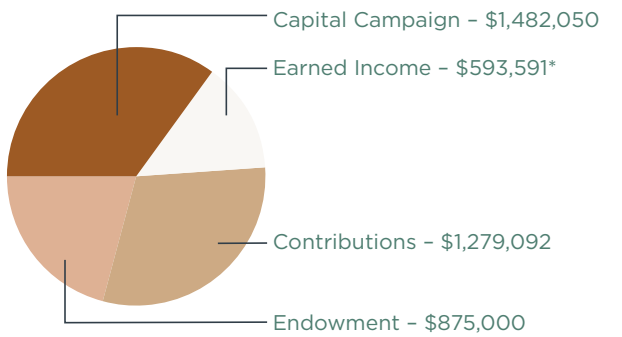
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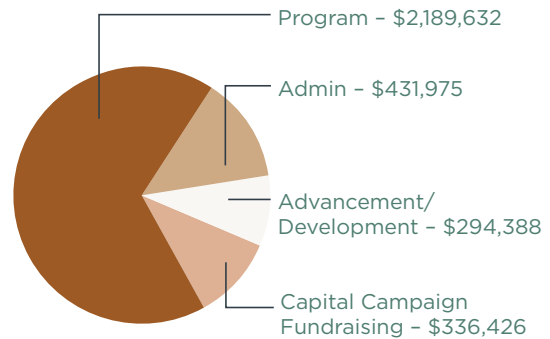
